PARTNERING TO FEED CHILDREN DURING THE SUMMER

Does your organization work with children during the summer? Have you noticed that children sometimes come hungry, or become hungry quickly? Is their ability to fully participate affected by this? You may be able to partner with another organization engaged in the summer food service program to deliver nutritious meals or snacks in conjunction with your activities. Summer Food Service Program



21 million children depend on free and reduced-price meals during the school year. During the summer months these same children could be going hungry because of lack of regular access to food. The Summer Food Service Program is intended to fill in the gaps between the school year when children are at a higher risk for food insecurity. The meals and snacks are free to all children 18 and younger and there is no registration process. It's not just lunch that is offered through this program. Some sites offer breakfast, snacks, and even supper.

In Utah, there are 38 sponsors operating 218 sites throughout the state this summer. U.S.-Japan relationship. In addition, the foundation supports programs that leverage the expertise in institutions of higher learning and NGOs on behalf of U.S.-Japan studies programs at the elementary, middle, and high school levels in both countries; present research, policy studies, and media programs on U.S.-Japan issues to an audience of pre-college students and their teachers; and enhance, expand, and preserve the study of the Japanese language at the pre-college level in the United States through professional development opportunities for teachers, national standards, and performance assessments.

Proposed projects should seek to incorporate one or more of these elements in a way that is particularly suited to the need(s) in pre-college education they seek to address. The above guidelines should not be seen as a deterrent to innovative new proposals and concepts.

The American Academy in Rome is a leading American overseas center for independent studies and advanced research in the fine arts and humanities.

The Rome Prize is awarded annually to emerging artists and scholars who exemplify the highest standard of excellence in arts and humanities scholarship. Each Rome Prize winner is provided with a stipend, meals, a bedroom with private bath, and a study or studio. (Those with children under the age of 18 live in partially subsidized apartments nearby.) ARTS PROGRAMS

ASSETS FOR INDEPENDENCE DEMONSTRATION PROGRAM

Department of Health and Human Services, Administration for Children and Families - OCS

Participants open an IDA and save earned income that is matched by project funds. The combined participant savings and project matching funds will be used for an allowable asset: a first home, a business, or post-secondary education or training. Projects also assist participants in obtaining the skills and information necessary to achieve economic self-sufficiency. Grantees are encouraged to tailor the strategies and services they offer to the needs of their project participants and the opportunities in their community. Examples of activities in this area include financial education, asset-specific training, financial coaching, credit-building services, credit/debt counseling, and assistance with tax credits and tax preparation. AFI projects must be funded with a combination of the federal AFI grant and cash from non-federal sources. The amount of cash from non-federal sources must be at least equal to the federal AFI grant amount. Applicants must provide documentation of commitment of non-federal funds in their application. Specific requirements for this documentation will be included in the funding opportunity announcement.

SAFE WATER FUNDING

NEW safe water funding opportunity announcement (FOA) from the CDC Division of Emergency & Environmental Health Services. This FOA seeks applications from state and local health departments and U.S. territories and Native American tribal public health agencies. The intended audiences of this FOA are communities and populations using small drinking water systems (e.g., private wells, springs, cisterns, tankered water) that are not covered under the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA). Funding these initiatives will improve the recipients' ability to identify and address drinking water program performance gaps, improve efficiency and effectiveness of drinking water programs, and to identify and reduce exposures leading to contamination of drinking water.

SAFE WATER SYSTEMS / RURAL

The Emergency Community Water Assistance Grants (USDA-RD) Program helps eligible rural communities recover from or prepare for emergencies that result in a decline in capacity to provide safe, reliable drinking water for households and businesses. Federally recognized Tribal lands and colonias are also eligible. Privately owned wells are not eligible.

- Up to \$150K for repairs to breaks/leaks in existing water distribution lines, & related maintenance.
- Up to \$500K for construction of a new water source, intake &/or treatment facility or waterline extensions.

ENTREPRENEURS WITH EFFICIENCIES FOR COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTERS

Grants of up to \$1.5 million will be awarded to companies with technology- or service-based solutions that enable community health centers and clinics to stretch their resources, increase patient access to care, and/or lower the cost of providing care. To be eligible, companies must be based in the United States and demonstrate how their product or service can maintain or improve patient experience while enhancing health center efficiency by at least 20 percent, provide access to highly needed health service(s) for a hundred thousand patients annually, and/or reduce costs by \$25 million annually.

SEED MONEY / SOCIAL ENTREPRENEURS

Small seed grants will be awarded to "practical dreamers" launching projects that promote compassion, community health and wellness, environmental sustainability, and/or justice in all its forms. Specifics on what will be funded and what will not are listed on the website. Projects should be in early stages of development, when a little bit of money will go a long way.
