

Eligible Subgrantees and Service Areas

1. Bear River Association of Governments, 170 North Main, Logan, Utah 84321, (435) 752-7242. The AOG serves Box Elder, Cache and Rich counties. The program has operated in this area since 1976, first through a CAP and now through the AOG. This agency also provides services to the Shoshone Indian Tribe.
2. Davis County Health Department - Tri -County Weatherization Program, Freeport Center Bldg. A16-D Clearfield, Utah 84016 (801) 451-3256. The agency serves Davis and Morgan Counties and has done so since September 1976, first as a CAP and now under direct county government. Beginning in May of 1997 this agency underwent a name change and assumed the responsibilities of weatherization in Weber County.
3. Salt Lake Community Action Program, 231 West 800 South, Salt Lake City, Utah 84101, (801) 359-2444. The CAP serves Salt Lake and Tooele counties and in 1984 took over service to the Goshute Indian Tribe in Irapah, Utah. The CAP has administered the program since 1976.
4. Housing Authority of Utah County, 735 So. University Ave., Provo, Utah 84601-5184 (801) 344-5184. The HAUC serves Utah, Wasatch and Summit counties and has done so since March 1976.
5. Six County Association of Governments, 250 North Main, Richfield, Utah 84701, (435) 893-0742. The AOG serves Juab, Millard, Piute, Sanpete, Sevier and Wayne counties and has done so since March 1976. On April 1, 1987 the agency started serving the Paiute Indian tribe located within the Six County boundaries.
6. Five County Association of Governments, WX Office 2344 W. Industry Way #2 Cedar City Utah 84721 435-586-0585 and Five County AOG, Ma in Office 1070 West 1600 South, Bld. B, P.O. Box 1550, St. George, Utah 84771-1550, (435) 673-3548. The AOG serves Beaver, Garfield, Iron, Kane and Washington counties and has done so since March 1976. In addition, the AOG took over administration of the weatherization program for the Paiute Indian tribe in 1983. On April 1, 1987 the AOG started serving only those portions of the Paiute Indian tribe located within the Five County area.
7. Uintah Basin Association of Governments, 330 East 100 South, Roosevelt, Utah 84066, (435) 722-5205. The AOG serves Daggett, Duchesne, and Uintah counties and has done so since March 1976. In 1981 it took over service to the Ute Indian Tribe in Ft. Duchesne.
8. Southeastern Utah Association of Local Governments, 375 South Carbon Avenue, Price, Utah 84501, (435) 637-7323. The agency serves Carbon, Emery, Grand and San Juan counties. The program was operated by the Southeastern Utah Community Action Agency from March 1976 through 1984 when it was then transferred over to the Southeastern Utah Association of Local Governments (SEUALG). The Utah Navajo Development Council (UNDC) subcontracted the program for the Utah portion of the Navajo Reservation through the Southeastern Utah Community Action Agency from March 1976 until 1984 when UNDC was funded directly by the state. On July 1, 2000 weatherization for the Utah portion of the Navajo Reservation was consolidated into the existing SEUALG Weatherization program. The agency also provides services to the Ute Indian tribe located in this area.

All proposed eligible agencies were selected on the basis of past experience, public comment, technical abilities and the fact that no other qualified agencies have expressed interest either at the annual public hearing or any other time during the year. The Tri-County Weatherization Program was awarded Weber County after successfully competing for it in an RFP process. However, if a circumstance should arise which would require the Division of Housing and Community Development to contract with another agency to serve a designated service area or to consolidate agencies, the following alternate agencies may be considered:

- a) County Housing Authorities
- b) Salt Lake Neighborhood Housing Services
- c) Salt Lake Community Services Council
- d) Wasatch Front Regional Council
- e) Area-wide vocational schools
- f) Neighboring weatherization subgrantee agencies
- g) Indian Tribes

Replacement of the above listed eight sub-grantees with one of the alternate agencies listed may be handled without further public hearings. Federal law requires that existing weatherization agencies must receive additional consideration.
